Unique, Not Different

Unity is defined as "a thing forming a complex whole." In science, a unit is a grouping that helps define like things, and for example, in biology, species is the fundamental unit of classification recognized in zoology and genetics. All humans in the world today are defined as Homo sapiens; therefore, in this measurement of unity, all humans are classified the same. Humans are fundamentally different than dogs and cats or even great apes that share the family designation of Hominidae. Genetically, humans are so similar that less than 1 percent of the DNA is different from person to person.

When we look at the world around us, however, we draw a different conclusion. Humans have treated each other with great respect or disdain based on perceived differences. Fundamentally, we are similar because "...God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him" (Genesis 1:27), but we are unique as we read in Psalm 139:13–14, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made." He created humanity for a purpose, and that purpose was to reflect who He is to creation. Along the way, we decided we wanted to reflect ourselves, and this led to the destruction and disorder we see in the world around us.

God implemented the next part of his plan by setting apart the people of Israel. His directive and desire for the nation was to show the world God and help the world to see His glory. The nation was unique from their neighbors, but they were seen as different and a threat. Time after time, we see this occur because the people and leaders of Israel reflected themselves over their unique mission from God. God is not honored, and He brings honor to himself by showing the nation their need for a savior.

Finally, God's plan culminates in His love for mankind through sending Jesus, who is God, as a perfect example and sacrifice. In Jesus' prayer for all believers in John 17:20–23, His plan is revealed,

"I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one — I in them and you in me—so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me."
